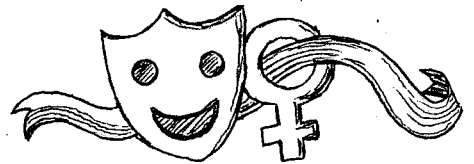
# LINDER S*T*er|i 9.

Lovely Linder is one of the ladylike lights on the boy-centric history of Manchester's music scene, as a performance artist and with her melodic pop/indie/jazz band Ludus. A visual artist, magazine editor, singer and musician, Linder lit up the late 70s and early 80s art scene like a match in a gas tank!

Linder's artworks included single covers for The Buzzcocks and albums by Magazine, often juxtaposing images of porn with photos from fashion magazines and domestic appliances. "Men's magazines were either DIY, cars or porn," she told The Guardian. "Women's magazines were fashion or domestic stuff. So, guess the common denominator: the female body. I made these peculiar jigsaws highlighting these various cultural monstrosities."

In 1982 Linder played a famous gig at The Hacienda, putting tampons stained with fake blood on every table and showing her disapproval of Bucks Fizz's Eurovision-winning, skirt-ripping dance routine by wearing a dress made of meat and tearing it off to reveal a large black dildo underneath. "Meat and tampons were supposed to represent the reality of womanhood," she said, "and the dildo was manhood, the invisible male of pornography." Wow, here's one lady who can talk dirty and make you think!

## Funny females



On Thursday night Penny Broadhurst will be compering the Ladyfest Comedy Night. Penny has risen to the task of proving that yes, Feminists do have a sense of humour with a selection of some of the wittiest females around, including Isy Suttie, Jo Neary, Lou Conran and Daisy Connolly. And no, it's not all jokes about periods! The Ladypress caught up with Penny to find out what to expect...

**So, a female comedy night without squirming male audience members?**

I've seen a lot of female stand-ups who have descended into that trap of thinking that they must already be alienating a male audience and therefore they should only speak to the women in the audience about subjects like shoes, shopping and menstrual flow. It's OK to do a bit of that, but it doesn't interest me particularly and it alienates as many women as men. Then it perpetuates the stereotype that women a) aren't funny and b) only have a limited range of things they talk about. While I recognise there is a place for female-centric comedy about perhaps generic subjects, I wanted to show people that there was more out there. In female comedy and comedy in general, there is an alternative to the mainstream and the stereotypes.

**As well as being compere, you were the curator of this night. How did you select the performers?**

My criteria was people I've seen before who were very funny and I would feel passionate about when describing the show to others. The first half of the night is traditional stand-up, with jokes and talking, and the second half is character comedy and songs. There's more to live comedy than punchlines and I wanted to show that.

**Is there any one in particular you are looking forward to seeing perform?**

I'm looking forward to them all, but I know that Isy Suttie has written some amazing new songs. Think Victoria Wood, only younger and with an indie bent. I think she's amazing. Jo Neary's no doubt got some new characters to dazzle us too, and her singing voice is to die for. Billie Holiday, anyone?

## In an odd universe

Ladyfest Leeds is excited and proud to present the 'Views From Nowhere' exhibition, an attempt to snapshot just some of the emerging and existing creative energies existant within and available to Leeds at present and is privileged to bring them together within the unique settings of Holy Trinity Church.

The exhibition runs from the 10th to the 14th of April and during that time will proudly showcase the paintings of Brighton based Artist, Karen Constance. Karen's stunning painted artwork represents a mystifying and odd universe. The bright and lurid colours of her work will primarily lure you in, sweet style, but it doesn't take long before the goofed out and bent content takes hold and really snatches you. You are never really sure what is going on in this place populated by acid damaged individuals, seeping wounds, 'knowing' wildlife, feral children, unknown exotic narcotics, strange skin conditions and so much more.

Karen is also performing with her experimental/noise band, Polly Shang Kuan at Joseph's Well on Saturday 14th, alongside her other band members, Moreen Farrell and Maya-Victoria Kjellstrand. The Polly Shang Kuan Band have been playing since 1999. They have a 7-inch released on Thurston Moore's Ecstatic Peace label and have an LP pending on Ultra Eczema.

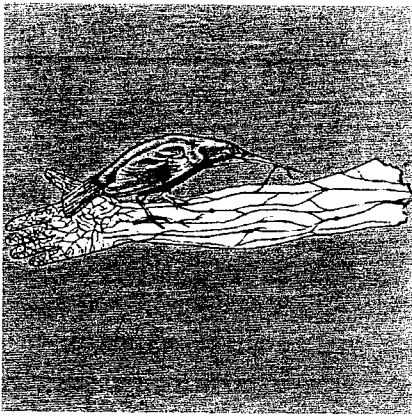
Prior to Ladyfest Melanie Maddison caught the chance to interview Karen for Colouring Outside The Lines zine about her art

**Melanie Maddison:** I am aware that your band, Polly Shang Kuan have played at a Ladyfest, and you are set to exhibit some of your artwork at this year's Ladyfest Leeds. How important to you are events which celebrate, and importantly, encourage female creativity and expression?

**Karen Constance:** I'm all for encouraging anyone to express themselves, whether its through art or music or whatever their thing is, be it male or female.

**MM:** Polly Shang Kuan are primarily a 'noise' band, and your artwork also tackles some quite sinister themes. Both appear to be complex and challenging. What is your view of creating such "difficult"art?





**KC:** I don't think of my art as challenging or difficult, if people choose to think that way when they look at them then it's whatever is going on in their minds that is setting those wheels in motion. To me my art has a lot of humour in it.

**MM:** You have worked collaboratively with other artists, such as the 20 double sided card prints in a handmade wallet that you made with Lauren Naylor. How does creating artwork collaboratively benefit your personal creativity?

**KC:** I love collaborations, I'd like to do more, I find it exciting waiting to see what the other person produces or puts over your input, I'm talking both about art and music.

**MM:** For me, one of the most engaging pieces you've created, which may be viewed as somewhat provocative, is the painting of a squirrel eating a baby's head....

**KC:** Actually these images are usually collaged together before I paint them so its not like I decide right, I'm going to paint this squirrel eating a baby's head, it came out that way because it looked good first as a collage.

**MM:** By creating so many paintings featuring subjects that are half human and half animal (such as human bodies with animal heads), what do you think it says about the interactions between humans and animals?

**KC:** never really thought about it, though now I look around at my paintings and there is a lot of human/animal content. Maybe its saying "f\*\*\*\*" you man, from the animals point of view.

**MM:** To what degree do you agree that art should depict the reality and honesty of life, regardless of how 'surreal' the portrayal of it may be in your own work?

**KC:** Art can depict whatever it wants, that's one of the things I f\*\*\*\*ing love about it, its like cartoons, anything can happen.

**MM:** What are the most enjoyable or rewarding aspects of creating art for you?

**KC:** I enjoy every part of it, the beginning when there's nothing on the canvas right through to knowing that was the final stroke. It's also a good feeling when someone wants to pay you for it.

# THE TERMITE CLUB

- TONIGHT - for one night only!!!

does Ladyfest...

Termites are a fairly homogenous bunch, you'd imagine. Trampling along and reducing wooden houses to sawdust probably leaves little room to express one's termitey individuality.

But a Leeds-based group have been demonstrating the idiosyncratic nature of the little mischief-makers for nearly a quarter of a century. Born in the improbable location of upstairs at the Adelphi (over a few pints of bitter), the Termite Club have been at the forefront of the city's experimental arts scene for 23 years.

Their original aim was straightforward enough - to provide a platform for a then non-existent alternative music scene. But the club has gone on to encompass a lot more than that and now champions a whole host of creative endeavours, including poetry and performance, as well as any music deemed 'difficult'.

The Termite Club is joining forces with Ladyfest Leeds tonight to offer experimental arts lovers a whole night of treats in the awe-inspiring locale of the Holy Trinity Church.

Here is a sneak preview of some of the weird and wonderful events planned...

**7 Hertz** are a jazz and folk-inspired improvisational band, playing a veritable rainbow of instruments from glockenspiel and double bass to French horn and broken glass. They recorded their first album in a disused church, so the Holy Trinity will no doubt feel like home to them.

**Yaitrei ß** will be performing a unique slot for Ladyfest Leeds, combining the commendable activities of music-making

and recycling. Going under the unofficial title of 'Freya and the Glass Orchestra', it promises to be a visual and aural treat, as five performers make any sounds they can out of home-made and shop-bought glass objects.

**Freya** told the Ladypress: "I got the idea for the glass orchestra one day when I was at a gig at Holy Trinity Church and they had candles in jam jars and as they carried them, they chinked and chimed in a magical way and the sound reverberated across the space and I thought it was really beautiful.

"For a while after that I was threatening to do a performance there on jam jars and strange Freya vocals, which I may yet do one day so be warned!

"I have worked hard the last few days and now have many interesting glass instruments that I have accumulated as "ready mades". This involved a lot of tapping on glass and shop assistants smiling at me as I arrange their glassware in pitch order! We are also going to use heaps of imagination to come up with interesting glass sounds and to make it all work.

"It will be a really special and beautiful sound experience."

**Mz Sojourn** - Not since Grover did his turn on Sesame Street has a dustbin lid proved so entertaining. The aforementioned musical instrument is combined with the more traditional drums, guitar and vocals to create Mz Sojourn's very own dream music and noir ballads.

**Ocelocelot**, otherwise known as the Termite Club's very own Mel,

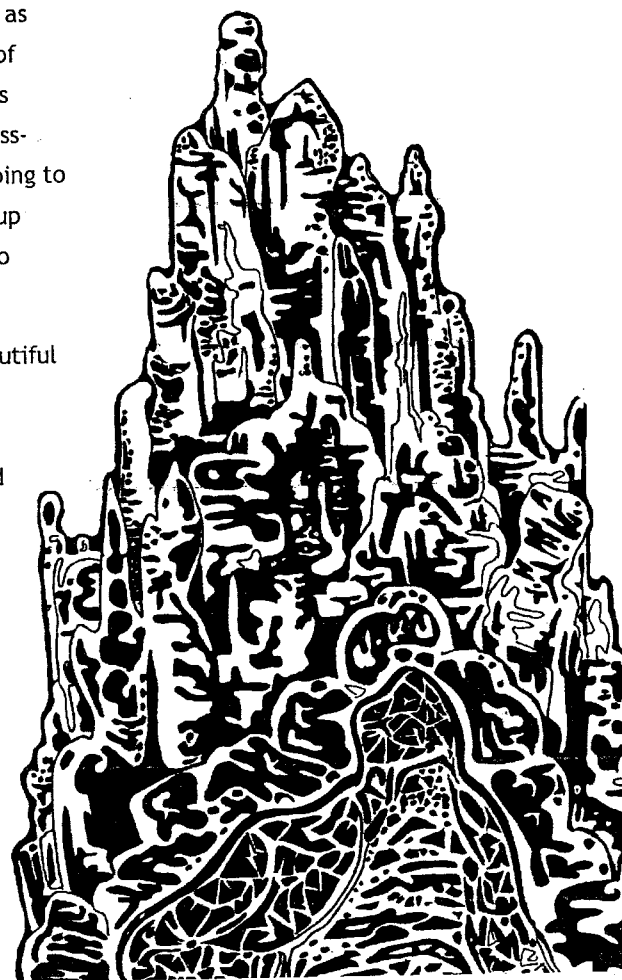
uses only shortwave radios to produce unique - and therefore unrepeatable - symphonies. The signals picked up by her kit all depend on the specific situation, so even the artist herself won't know what to expect.

Other performances include ghetto-blower wailer **Lumps**, the mushroom-obsessed **Kagami Shinohara**, crazy dancing troupe **The Pippits** and improvised guitar duo **CooperJonez**.

The Termite Club Does Ladyfest runs tonight from 7pm to 12 midnight.

### 11. Fake Tan - Boy's Club

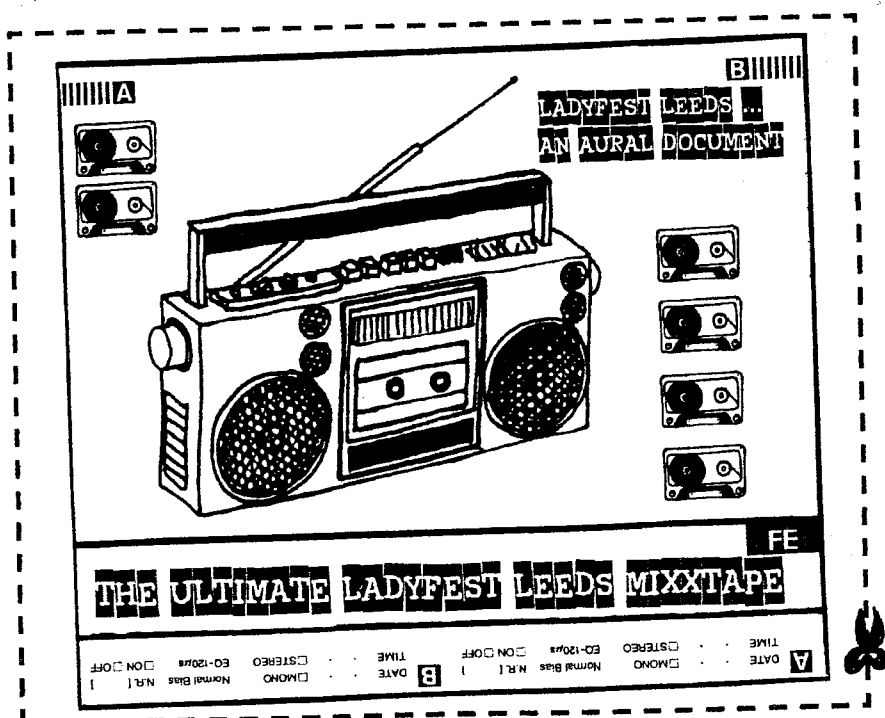
